

# Cedarbrae Branch Historical Highlights



#### Site Acquisition, Library Construction and Opening, 1958-1966




Markham Road and Greencrest Circuit site, southeast section, 1965

Part of the site was chosen for its prominence and accessibility. Part was acquired in 1958, with an additional parcel "to square off this property" purchased in 1965.

The "highly sculptured, honeycomb-like roof line" was an important architectural element.
Cedarbrae Secondary School, opened in 1960, is visible on the west side of Markham Road.
Th library leased the house on the east side of Markham Road to tenants, and demolished it in 1981 for the expansion.

Wood predominated, left a natural colour "to give a warm, friendly atmosphere."

Architect Irving Grossman placed the library "in as dramatic a way as possible," so it would be a focal point of the community.

The main entrance was on the upper level, accessed by a concrete ramp from the east parking lot and a steep angled concrete stair from the northwest.

### Cedarbrae Regional Library, Scarborough Public Library

Irving Grossman, Architect. Total cost: \$668,000. Size: 24,580 square feet


- 1958 Scarborough Public Library Board acquires a site on the east side of Markham Road, just south of Lawrence Avenue. It considers using the house on the property for a temporary library.
- The Library Board approves a five-year plan on 12 January that includes acquiring additional property at the southeast corner of Markham Road and Ring Road (now Greencrest Circuit) in 1961, and building Scarborough's first regional branch on the site in 1964.
- 1965 Cedarbrae Regional Library is chosen as the name, the service region is defined and Irving Grossman, Architect, is retained, 27 May. Purchase of the Geller property for \$40,000 is completed, 27 October.
- 1966 Construction starts in January. The cornerstone is laid, 25 May.

  The library officially opens on 30 November, and is opened to the public, 1 December.

# Extension and Partial Renovation, 1979-1983



Florence Cruickshank, 14 April 1983. The new community room was named for Mrs. Cruickshank, who served on the Scarborough Public Library Board from 1974 to 1985. She died on 20 May 2008.

The extension was added to the south part of the building.

The two-story extension housed collections and provided larger meeting facilities for public programming.

#### Cedarbrae District Library, Scarborough Public Library Moffat, Moffat and Kinoshita/The Moffat Kinoshita Partnership Total cost: \$577,000. Expansion: 6,200 square feet

- 1979 Scarborough Board of Control purchases property adjacent to Cedarbrae District Library for its future expansion. The library board approves staff plans for the extension, 20 September.
- 1980 Moffat, Moffat and Kinoshita are appointed as architects, 18 November.
- 1981 Tenders are opened, 8 October. Construction begins in November.
- The library is closed for interior renovations on 29 November. The upper level is to reopen on 20 December, and the lower level on 3 January 1983.
- 1983 The new space is officially opened on 14 April.

#### **Major Renovation and Expansion, 2005-2010**





To create a more prominent street presence, two-storey glazed walls were introduced on the full extent of the north and west facades, and a large "LIBRARY" sign was displayed. As a result of the community consultation, the distinctive roofline was retained.

The main entrance was relocated to the lower level, approached through an exterior plaza that reflected the colours and the variety of reading and gathering spaces of the renovated interior.

The theme, "River Express," was used for the activity centre. Entered by river boat, inside were a large elephant bench, a bamboo wrapped dial-a-story, tropical trees, and a large animal mural.

## Cedarbrae Branch, Toronto Public Library Makrimichalos Cugini Architects. Total budget: \$9.15 million. Expansion: 4,345 square feet

- 2005 Cedarbrae Branch is identified in the library's capital budget for a major renovation, starting in 2007
- 2006 Agreement is made with Makrimichalos Cugini Architects, 7 March
- Public consultation is held, 23 January
  Preliminary plans are unveiled at an open house, 25 October
- 2008 Branch closes, 6 October, and construction starts
- 2010 Branch reopens, 6 December
